

In Her Own Words State Regent Kathy Rugh



As a child I was aware and proud of my ancestry – mostly German immigrants who arrived throughout the 1800's including my great-grandmother who I called Grossmutter – and a grandfather born in West Virginia whose last name was Hatfield. With the approach of the United States Bicentennial, it was this grandfather who researched and found our first patriot ancestor: Joseph Hatfield of Virginia, an Indian scout and spy. My grandfather joined the SAR and my mother immediately joined Freedom Hill Chapter, NSDAR. I became a member my senior year of college and have remained active for 47 years.



Born on a US Navy base in Morocco, where my father was stationed as an officer in the United States Marine Corps, I have lived all but five years of my life in Virginia. After four-year stints living in Quantico, VA and Camp Pendleton, CA, I grew up in Falls Church and Vienna, attending Fairfax County Public Schools.

I graduated from Mary Washington College (now the University of Mary Washington) in 1978 with a Bachelor of Arts degree in Art History. Following graduation, I began my career working in Washington DC and the McLean / Tysons area, while also remaining engaged in community volunteer service.

My DAR journey began with paging at both the state and national levels. My chapter supported me generously, even presenting me with my first national page pin. Over 22 years of paging, I was honored to serve as a personal page to four State Regents and two President Generals, and to chair the Virginia State Chair Page Committee for two terms.

One of my most treasured memories came in1990 when Centennial President General Marie Yochim, herself a Virginian, asked me to be her personal page at the NSDAR Centennial celebration. At the time, I explained to her that I would be eight months pregnant with our second child – a circumstance that was then considered unsuitable for paging. Marie responded firmly, "Well, how else are we to have future DAR members without pregnant pages?" And so, I served, doing my best to appear "elegant" in a rented maternity evening gown. I learned later that this was a turning point, and from then on pages were welcomed in service while pregnant.

Through the years I have held numerous leadership roles at the chapter, state, and national levels, beginning as a Junior member and chapter regent with our firstborn baby in tow. Most recently, I served as State Treasurer and Congress Chair of the Platform Committee at Continental Congress.

My husband Tim and I have been married for forty years. We raised our two daughters, both DAR members, in McLean. Today, they live nearby with their families, and we are blessed with three adorable granddaughters

under the age of three. In what little free time I can find, I enjoy gardening, needlepoint, and smocking for my little girls.

My late mother, Patricia Hatfield Mayer, was also deeply involved in DAR, serving as Virginia State Regent from 2004-2007. Though I so wish she were here to share this moment, I am grateful for her example and support as we each set our individual paths in DAR.

I am honored to serve as Virginia State Regent and, together with all of you, look forward to the work ahead as we dedicate ourselves to service, preservation, and the celebration of America250!

This is a unique opportunity for our organization to join with millions of other American citizens to celebrate this momentous occasion! How will you take time to reflect on the legacy which has been given to each of us?

Kathleen Mayer Rugh, the 43rd Virginia State Regent, has selected the theme of "Revolution to Legacy: Preserve, Protect, Remember" as a way to remind each of us that we must preserve our vital genealogical and historical records, we must protect them from further deterioration, and we must remember the deeds of our ancestors as THEY laid the foundations for the heritage we share today. The American Revolution led to our nation's founding. It is up to each of us to do what we can to preserve that legacy for those who will come after us.

Our challenge is to locate and identify those deteriorating records before the names contained in those records are lost to history. These can be found in each and every Virginia DAR District throughout the Commonwealth. Look in courthouses, libraries, historical societies, and in private collections.

Once identified, the State Regent and her Executive Board will select projects for restoration with funds provided directly to the State Regent's Project or through the purchase of State Regent's Project sales items. These records will be digitized so that future research efforts can be done electronically so as not to physically damage the records. Making these records accessible for genealogical research is key! Transcribing these records may also be part of the project.

Negotiations are ongoing with the Library of Virginia for related records projects...please stay tuned for future updates! Many exciting projects ahead!



The result? This is not only a gift to the Commonwealth of Virginia at this historic time. It is truly a gift to the Nation – as these records will then be accessible to all – not just those researching DAR lineage! The Virginia 250! Commission's theme is "America. Made in Virginia."

The Virginia DAR's State Regent's Project uniquely fits into that theme! The records we preserve and digitize today will continue to build on the importance of these records in capturing the history of our country before those pages crumble. Our efforts will confirm that America truly was made in Virginia!

How to Support the State Regent Project

- A beautifully crafted wooden magnet in the shape of the state of Virginia and showcasing dogwood blooms, for \$10,


- A set of ten eye-catching note cards featuring a blue dogwood bloom on a white background for \$12,

During her term, she raised funds to sponsor a room in the replica 1740 Washington House at Ferry Farm, the boyhood home of President George Washington. Having joined the DAR in 1984, she proudly represents Virginia as the President General.

THE EMBLEM: THE STORAGE TORCH

The emblem represents victory and immortality and is inspired by the Victorian bronze door plates at Memorial Continental Hall. The vtorch was originally inverted to symbolize a memorial to

Revolutionary War Patriots, it has been turned upright to signify the Nation's future and the legacy of service. The four pink gems placed on the laurel wreath honor the vision of the four Founders of DAR.

CONSTITUTION WEEK

SEPTEMBER 17 - 23, 2025

Our Nation's Constitution is a cornerstone of American ideals, and understanding it is particularly important as we approach the 250th anniversary of our country.

September 17 marks the start of Constitution Week, a celebration that includes the federally recognized Constitution Day. The Daughters of the American Revolution (DAR) played a pivotal role in establishing this observance. In April 1955, the DAR drafted a resolution that was sent to members of Congress. This resolution inspired a similar one in the Senate, which ultimately passed both houses and was signed into law by President Dwight D. Eisenhower in 1956.

Today, the DAR continues to be a leading force in promoting awareness of Constitution Week. The organization encourages its chapters and members to

actively participate in educating the public about the U.S. Constitution. Some ways DAR chapters and members can get involved are:

- Host a program: Chapters can schedule and present programs about the Constitution at local schools, libraries, or chapter meetings.
- <u>Secure proclamations:</u> Members can request local, city, and county Constitution Week proclamations and share them on social media to amplify the message.
- <u>Create displays:</u> Chapters can set up engaging displays in public spaces like libraries, schools, and community centers.
