llluminating Leadership and Service National Board of Management Meeting



Ever wondered how decisions are made for the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution? The National Board of Management (NBM) is the primary executive body that guides all decisions and operations for the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution (DAR). Composed of the twelve Executive Officers, twenty-one Vice Presidents General, and State Regents, the NBM is responsible for the general supervision of the DAR's assets and operations and issues key policy rulings. The NBM meets at the Washington, D.C. headquarters five times a year: in February, April, October, December, and during the Continental Congress in June/July.



Last week, the NBM met for three days of training, networking, and service. The events were exceptionally well organized and professionally run. Over the course of three busy days participants:

- Heard presentations from staff and national leaders on new initiatives designed to enhance the member experience and support chapter work.
- Placed a wreath at the American Red Cross Memorial across D Street from our buildings and participated in a service project assembling snack bags for Red Cross volunteers.
- Visited historic sites in Alexandria including Woodlawn and the Pope-Leighey House.
- Networked and shared ideas while enjoying meals with new acquaintances.
- Met at the historic Japanese Lantern and learned about the history of the Tidal Basin cherry trees during a presentation held in lieu of the planned mulching project for the DAR Day of Service (cancelled due to the government shutdown).

The National Board of Management (NBM) convened on Saturday morning at the DAR Headquarters. Some key decisions to come out of the meeting are summarized in the following section.

In 2015, I was honored to be the first Virginian named National Outstanding Junior when Mrs. Storage was State Regent.

My husband, Darrin, and I met at Virginia Tech through Alpha Phi Omega Service Fraternity. We've been involved in service since day one—from Red Cross blood drives and Camp Powhatan cleanups to SAR Color Guard events and church tech support. Fun fact: we share the same birthday (but he got there first!).

For nearly 15 years, I've run a home-based picture framing studio, and someday hope to expand into a retirement business with laser art, custom ornaments and other gifts. I love crafting and enjoy cross-stitching, shuttle tatting, and decorating for Christmas!

PRESERVING THE LEGACY OF OCTOBER 19, 1781:

Preservation of the Yorktown Custom House

Although more than 300 years have passed since its construction, the Custom House remains much as it did when built c 1720. An important landmark in terms of commerce for the Port of York, the Custom House serves today as an important reminder of our heritage.

The Custom House was originally built as a storehouse and office for the collection of customs by merchant Richard Ambler.

NSDAR first expressed interest in preserving historic sites in Yorktown in 1905. There was no DAR chapter, however, until February 2, 1922 when the Comte de Grasse Chapter was organized. Two prioritized goals of the new chapter were to acquire and restore the Old Custom House and to plan and promote the annual observance of the Surrender of Cornwallis on October 19, 1781. The building was to be used as a chapter house and would include a museum for the collection and proper care of documents and rare treasures.

Comte de Grasse Chapter purchased the property in 1923. Eighty percent of the structure as it stands today is that of the original building. Old materials were repurposed from other properties so as to match those original to the 18th century structure. On November 15, 1930 the rejuvenated Custom House was dedicated to "the memory and the spirit of the men and women who achieved American Independence."



Over its more than 300 years, the Custom House has been used as troop barracks, Confederate headquarters, private school for Black children, barbershop, bank, and store.

The Custom House and its health stand not only as a testament to the quality of materials and craftmanship of early times but also to the commitment and love shone in its stewardship by the diligent and patriotic ladies of Comte de Grasse Chapter.



Founding Regent, Mrs. Emma Leake Chenoweth wrote: "the chief charm to me is that this old building was already one associated with this country at the time of surrender and certainly all the great men so prominent in the history, not only of this country, but of France and England and other countries doubtless were in this building at one time or another."

October 19, 1924, the anniversary of the surrender of Cornwallis, a celebration was held under the auspices of the chapter thus instituting the regular observance of this important event. In 1948, the Yorktown Day Association was formed to continue the commemorative activities.

Throughout the years the Comte de Grasse Chapter has continued its historical, educational, and patriotic service in the community. The Custom House has been opened to the public since 1930. . . even during the recent pandemic.

The Custom House site has experienced historic events of war and also celebrations. The Custom House has witnessed billeted troops and their military generals, US Presidents and DAR President Generals and individuals interested in history and its preservation in Yorktown "Where Independence Was Won."

PARLIAMENTARY POINTERS: MAKING A MOTION

To bring a new item of business to the floor, a member must make a motion. That is how you get the ball rolling. There are 8 steps to making a motion:

- 1. Rise or raise your hand to be recognized by the chair.
- 2. The chair recognizes the speaker.
- 3. The member makes the motion, stating: "I move to . . ." or "I move that . . ." The chair or your Standing Rules may require that a written copy of the motion be presented to the chair and recording secretary.
- 4. The motion is seconded by another member.
- 5. The chair restates the pending motion.
- 6. The chair calls for debate on the motion, recognizing all who wish to speak.
- 7. The chair conducts a vote on the motion.
- 8. The chair announces the results, "The ayes have it, and the motion is adopted."

CAPTURING THE CHAPTERS

BERMUDA HUNDRED AND CHESTERFIELD COURTHOUSE CHAPTERS TACKLE PATRIOT RECORDS PROJECT TOGETHER

Since 2020, Bermuda Hundred has participated in NSDAR's Patriot Records Project to index every name in Revolutionary War records available to the DAR. Chesterfield Courthouse Chapter joined in 2024.

Since the beginning of 2025, we've indexed some 4,100 names, while capturing titles, positions, ranks, locations, and other information. This enables anyone searching the index to find service for a Patriot or the history of the American Revolution.

Quirky handwriting or the quality of document images provides challenges, but volunteers have found that working in collaboration solves problems and the camaraderie is a welcome relief for what could be tedious work.

In recognition of the 70th anniversary of Constitution Week, members of the Colonel William Preston Chapter of Roanoke commissioned Lamar Advertising to create two free digital public service announcement billboards in the Roanoke Valley promoting Constitution Week.

Both signs were free of charge because Lamar Advertising recognized DAR as a nonprofit organization and were strategically placed at busy light intersections in Roanoke. The PSA ran for 15 days from September 8 - 22 and averaged 2,232 impressions per day per sign for a grand total of 69,378 impressions. Imagine the number of cars that drove by and saw the announcement!
